AGRICULTURE

SEVA from the very beginning is taking special care for promoting **Organic Agriculture** through its initial project **Vikas Kendra**. The movement was initiated in 1991 in SEVA's own land of 10 bigha and in the land of 100 farmers of 10 villages and at present there are 849 farmers (149.2 ha. Land) who are under agreement with us to produce Jute, vegetables and field crops using only Organic manures and Organic pesticides to eradicate diseases caused due to inorganic pesticides. They are spread over 17 villages in Baduria and Deganga Block. Out of these farmers some of them are engaged in producing Phospho-compost, Vermi-compost, Liquid manure, Green manure for their own use. All the organic farmers are also engaged in making organic pesticides under our direction and guidance. Different training, awareness programme, seed distribution had been organized towards this goal. Vikas Kendra developed some Indigenous Technology for the preparation of liquid manure for application on the crops, botanical pesticides for the control of pest and disease. Those are eco-friendly. The government has also extended support for organic farming through their PKVY and bio-village programmes.

Vegetable Cultivation:

This year on behalf of SEVA, the team from Vikas Kendra visited the Umphun cyclone devastated villages where the distressed farmers lost their home, crops and most precious belongings – the seeds. We collected different vegetable seeds such as gourd, bitter gourd, ridged gourd, brinjal, tomatoes, spinach, carrot, radish etc and distributed among 40 farmers of Gaihata, 58 farmers in Baduria and 90 farmers in Minakhan block. On cultivation the farmers got Rs.2000-3000 by selling the vegetables. In Vikas Kendra training for nutrition garden was imparted to two groups of adolescent girls with 25 girls in each group under SAG-KP (Scheme for Adolescent Girls and Kanyasree Prakalpa Convergence Programme). On completion of the training the girls were provided with medicinal plants and vegetable saplings.

Organic Jute:

Keeping in view the need for organic packaging materials, the organic Jute production was initiated in the year 2006 and is still continuing. We collect and supply the jute directly to two jute mills for which farmers get 20-25% higher than the market price. SEVA is monitoring the organic production on behalf of Ganges and Gloster Jute Mills. The organic certification

is done by IMO as arranged by the Ganges and Gloster Jute Mills in their respective areas. This year 450 farmers produced organic jute in 102.2 hec. land with the help of Ganges Jute Mill. They were provided with 500 Kg. seeds free of cost from JCI through Ganges.

Gloster Limited also supports organic Jute cultivation in collaboration with SEVA. This year 350 farmers of Kankrasuti and Parpatna have cultivated organic jute in 80.2 ha land. The farmers have been provided with 470 Kg. seeds free of cost from JCI through Gloster.

This year we received 16 Seed Planter machines and 16 Tiller machines from Jute Corporation of India (JCI) and distributed among 10 villages where those have been used to cultivate 327 bigha land. On using Seed Planter, the farmers could reduce requirement of seed, cost of tilling was also reduced and production was increased.

Organic Bazaar:

This organic Bazaar programme is functioning since last 19 years in our village and also in some pockets in Kolkata. We are also arranging door to door delivery of grocery, vegetables and products of our food processing unit in different parts of Kolkata on every Saturday. The Organic Bazar programme is supported by SEVA through our staff and Eco-volunteers, the farmers are getting benefitted from this market since it's a farmer to consumer direct initiative.

Support for Jute from different agencies:

Jute Corporation of India (JCI): In this year ie in 2020-21, we have enlisted 800 farmers under JCI. The farmers have received 16 seed planter machines, 16 tiller machines and CRIJAF SONA powder for retting of 1.5 tonnes jute. On application of SONA powder color and weight of jute improved thus benefit of farmers enhanced.

Indian Jute Industries Research Association (IJIRA): We have arranged IJIRA Shubhra for 928 farmers for extraction of jute fiber. This better-quality of fiber has ensured higher price for the farmers.

Agriculture Marketing:

This year we from SEVA could arrange *Chatal* for 12 farmers under the West Bengal govt scheme of *Amar Dhan Amar Chatal*. These family - level paddy processing yards are extremely helpful for processing of crops and have increased enthusiasm of the farmers.

Parampara Krishi Vikash Yojana (PKVY)

Since March, 2015 with government assistance 100 farmers in the two clusters of Panji, Pingaleswar and Jangalpur have prepared Vermi-compost pit and producing organic fertilizers. The farmers are producing organic vegetables under the supervision of SEVA and directly selling their products at the government outlets at Baguiati and Dumdum. This infrastructural facilities and higher rate of return have enhanced the interest of farmers for organic production. This year each of the 100 farmers have received 12 KG paddy seeds and Rs. 1300/- to cover the cost of agricultural production under this yojana.

Digantika Trust (Mayer Swapna)

To support the initiative of SEVA to help the farmers distressed in Umphun Cyclone, Digantika Trust provided paddy seeds to 100 farmers of Baduria Block through Vikas Kendra.

Enhancement of livelihood Security of Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe Farmers.

Since 2013 CRIJAF with the help of Vikas Kendra is working for livelihood development of marginal and small farmers. This year 160 farmers of Dwipmedia, Panji, Pingaleshwar and Jassaikati are provided with different trainings, agricultural equipments, paddy and jute seeds, fertilizers and CRIJAF Sona enabling the respective families to come out of extreme poverty.

Other relief activities

Distributed paddy seeds and vegetable seeds after Umphan cyclone to 36 farmers of Chandpara, 28 farmers of Mangalnagar and 120 farmers of Mohanpur and Kalibari of Minakhan.

Residential Training on Goat Management

Residential training for 7 days on Goat Management was held in Vikas Kendra from 20 March, 2021 to 26 March, 2021. Total 19 students from 15 blocks of 10 district participated in the Training.

Govt. Training Programme

Central Research Institute for Jute and Allied Fibers(CRIJAF), arranged some training programme in their own premises. Our farmers and staff joined that training programme for gathering of knowledge. The details are given bellow:

HEALTH

A research program for equality and sustainability in the health system was started in 2010 with the financial support of Memisa and the supervision of WBVHA. The project aims to bridge the policy and practical gaps in the public health system and to bridge the gap through advocacy with information-rich evidence at various levels of government departments and to make people aware and encouraged to take up government services and Improving the health system through cooperation and coordination with the public to enhance the skills of government service providers and to accelerate the continuous work of improving the health system and its benefits to create a resource person among the people to influence other communities in the society. Continues the following works are being carried out in an integrated manner in 5 Gram Panchayats of Baduria and Amdanga blocks.

A.1.JassaikatiAtghara GP 2. Jadurhati Uttar GP 3.Chandipur GP under Baduria Development Block and B.1. Sadhanpur GP 2. Chandigarh GP under Amdanga Block.

Vikas Kendra (a project of SEVA) have created various community groups for effective implementation of 'National Health Mission', which is under **Basic Health Care and Support Programme (BHCSP)**. We have the support from **MEMISA – DGD, Belgium** through **West Bengal voluntary Health Association (WBVHA)** since 2010. Vikas Kendra is a partner of North 24 Parganas District Health Forum. Health Forum has been working in North 24 Parganas since 2006 for strengthening the Government Health System , ensuring the Health Rights , organizing CBO's /NGO's who are working in the field of Health, Data sharing and policy level advocacy.

For strengthening of health system, ensuring health rights and sharing of Data among the community through the involvement of the community we have strengthened the Community leaders, Adolescents, RMPs, SHGs and others. We organized meetings, workshops, trainings for their strengthening and capacity building as furnished below:

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Titumeer Fair:

Titumeer is the 1st martyr in India's quest for freedom, who gave his life on 19th November, 1831, while defending his Bamboo Stockade. We organize an Annual Fair in his memory to spread the message of national integrity and development. As martyr Titumeer was son of the soil local population participates in thousands. Considering the pandemic situation, instead of usual three-day program, the festival was held for one day on 19th November, the day of martyrdom of Mir Nishad Ali Titumeer.

In the morning Tribute was paid by a small procession at Narkelberia, five kilometres away from Atghara, North 24 PGS where Titumeer fought his battle in 1831 from his legendary bamboo stockade.

From 12 noon - Blood Donation Camp was held where 56 (fifty-six) socially aware participants donated blood for the suffering people of the society in death-bed. A big health workers team came under the leadership of AVBD (Association of voluntary Blood Donors), Kolkata.

A Cultural Compartment - a literary session was also there one, as usual. About 60 (sixty) participants recited their writings in this Kabi Sammelan. And this whole episode was anchored by our adviser and local eminent Master Ameer Ali Saheeb.

Library:

We have a library named Shaheed Titumeer Public Library. The library is a treasure house of 2350 books and magazines. All are welcome for library membership against a token subscription but library needs restoration. But it is becoming more and more challenging to attract new generation towards reading of books. New activities need to be taken to make the library attractive for the younger generation.

Food Processing Unit: 2020-21

Food Processing Unit is running successfully by the initiative of Vikas Kendra. Different kinds of Jam, Jelly, Mango Pickle, Mustered Mango, Squash, Tomato Sauce, honey, multi-grain cereal (Sattoo), spices and mustard oil were produced through Food Processing Unit in the financial year 2019-20. These food products with brand name 'Tripti' are sold in our Vikas Kendra counter, City Office, in our weekly market. Economically weaker women of the village and residents of Ananda Kendra Home get some financial support from this Unit.

Even during the pandemic Covid 19 period, we, on behalf of SEVA, kept continuing our FP Unit. We have market in Kolkata, Naihati and in some local villages also. And we marketed these items of nearly Rupees One Lakh and Two Thousand in this year. So, this processing is going on for the whole year. And like to carry on this unit in a bigger mode.

SISHU VIKAS KENDRA

The objective of Sishu Vikas Kendra (SVK) is to impart pre-primary education to the distressed rural children and upgrade them mentally and prepare them to be able to sustain educational pressure for the next higher classes. We took up the work of Child Development Centre not as a base point of education but as the platform to start with building mental set up to hold basic responsibilities. Keeping it in point of view, our teachers are advised for taking care of SVK children and they are doing their best in doing so and at the same time developing hearty relationship between local youth and our centers. They arrange monthly meeting with the mothers and also arrange other awareness programmes for them. After completing pre-primary education, we take them for admission to the nearest primary school and private missionary schools.

During the pandemic period of COVID-19, all the schools, all over the country, were kept CLOSED as per the Govt. measured protocol. But we kept contact with mothers / parent of our all the children/students in regular basis. On behalf of VIKAS KENDRA, during the pandemic period, especially during the lock-down period, we distributed to every family package of rice, pulse, mustered oils, with potatoes, onions and soaps also. And time to time we could arrange with the help of our friends from Kolkata GPO and other Postal units garments and food packets for the children. This year we have 24 children. We constantly kept communication with their parent so that they take CORONA vaccine in regular course.

JASSAIKATI CHOUDULIPADA PATHA-KENDRA:

Jassaikati Choudulipara, is an area under our Jassaikati Atghara Panchayet where a number of people dwell alongside a canal. They largely work as maid-servants, agricultural labourers or seasonal brickfield workers.

They used to collect their food from the canal and nearby marshlands, some kind of shrubs/stems, 'sanpla' etc. along with snails & periwinkles. They could not send their children to school as they lived hand to mouth. With the support from Digantika Trust, we could arrange to open a coaching center at Jassaikati-

Chandulipada Patha Kendra. Now the children are going there regularly and progressing as per the school curriculum.

DHARMAGOLA

Dharmagola is a community grain storage, it was established in 1987. The concept of Dharmagola is "To Stop Distress Sale". When Marginal Farmers & Small Farmers are producing grain in their own fields, at that same time huge production prevail in the market. When market price is down and middlemen take opportunity to make extra profit. So, to stop the Distress Sale, we purchase the grain at that time at market price, from Marginal & Small Farmers.

Dharmogola is an old concept to make a common warehouse based on trust and ethics. But presently the co-operative is facing challenges and is almost non-functional. New initiative is being taken to form another unit to guarantee better return for the farmers.

Baduria Vikas Farmers Producers Company: SEVA, with the support from NABARD have taken initiative to form a farmers' own company with 502 members from 17 villages of Baduria Block. The motto is to equalise the profit-price among the share-holder-farmers at the end of the year. Now their products are going to city Kolkata, once a week. Out of marketing of jute and other crops a turnover of nearly Rupees ten lakhs has been credited to FPC account this year. Our FPC is having own office and godown too. Our CEO keeps regular contact with the farmers and sellers.

Scheme for Adolescent Girls – Kanyasree Prakalpa (SAG-KP) Convergence Programme

Problematic Issues of Adolescent Girls in India:

Adolescent Girls are the young people aged between 10 to 19 years. It is a transitional stage of Physical and Psychological development from puberty to adulthood. About 21% of Indian Population is Adolescent girls (about 243 million). As per census 2011 West Bengal had 1.8 crores Adolescent Girls (20% of total population). In North 24 Parganas the number of AGs is 883110.

The main issues faced by Adolescent Girls are:

1. Physical & Mental Health Problem.
2. Drop out from School, Child Labour & Early Marriage
3. Under age sex.
4. Early Pregnancy.
5. Sexually transmitted infection and other infectious diseases due to poor hygienic life style.
6. Social Violence
7. Malnutrition
8. Suffering from Anemia.

Programme Overview:

As per State policy, there will be a single adolescent girls' empowerment programme to be implemented using ICDS (Integrated Child Development Scheme) platform in the state of West Bengal. All adolescent girls in the age group of 11-18 years under a particular AWC (Anganwadi Centre) will be covered under

this programme. This programme will be implemented in all 23 Districts across the state from FY 2019-20. This is a convergent scheme of all kind of adolescent girls' programmes like Scheme for Adolescent Girls (SAG) - erstwhile Sabla, Kanyashree Prakalpa and Weekly Iron and Folic Acid Supplementation (WIFS). This programme will strengthen community-based interventions on both nutrition and non-nutrition services towards empowerment of adolescent girls. Current programme will utilize resources available from SAG and Kanyashree Prakalpa. This programme will utilize technical support from UNICEF and CINI for achieving the expected results.

SAG-KP: Objectives:

- Enable the girls for self-development and empowerment.
- Improve their nutrition and health status.
- Promote awareness about Health, Hygiene and Nutrition.
- Support out of school Adolescent Girls to successful transition back to formal schooling or bridge learning or skill training.
- Upgrade their home-based life skills.
- Provide information /guidance about existing public services such as Primary Health Centers, Rural Hospitals / CHC, Post office, Bank, Police Station.
- Support for accessibility to avail vocational training.

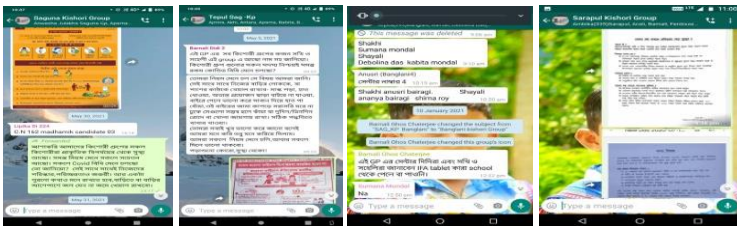

Our Experience – Umphun Cyclone Relief Scenario

Sharing an idea - Nothing original but rather a pragmatic application

The concern was to extend support to the small farmers and marginal agricultural laborers affected by Cyclone Umphun. We were having a meeting at Vikas Kendra, the project campus of our organization SEVA (Society for Equitable Voluntary Actions) at Atghara, North 24 Parganas to find out the most effective utilization of our meager fund collected and allotted for relief work. The proposals were -

1. Distribution of tarpaulin sheets.
2. Distribution of groceries.

It was evident that the situation had been different from the crisis of Lockdown period imposed to contain spread of Covid 19 in the pre-Umpun period. At that time people were not allowed to go out of their residences, or to work, they actually were stuck up at their respective places where they had been. So, the nature of extending support was different. But Umphun has changed the scenario. Roads are blocked; roofs damaged, electrical poles and lines are tattered by uprooted trees. Crops and vegetables perished due to heavy rain and cyclone. People are distressed in every respect. But now they are allowed to work. And we wanted to help.

In the meeting, the alternate view was to let the people decide what they need to enhance their purchasing power, give them money. We then requested our sponsors to support us to create work, where the marginal laborers will be engaged to earn money and their labour in turn will have impact on social necessities. To be precise – we calculated the total manpower required to clean and reconstruct the campuses of Vikas Kendra – a rural training centre with a library, post office and centre of social activities;

Ananda Kendra – a shelter home for destitute women and orphan children;

Shishu Vikas Kendra – a pre-primary school;

The estimate turned out to be approximately 120 labour days.

Thereafter, instead of using machines or engaging big contractors, we made a list of 40 marginal laborers of different vulnerable pockets of nearby villages. The average rate per day came around 350-400/-. So, as it turned out that by engaging 40 laborers for three days on an average, we will be able to generate an income of Rs.1000-1200 for each of them injecting fund in the rural economy enabling them to meet up their own needs.

So, by utilizing the fund allotted for providing relief to Umpun-affected farmers, SEVA instead of doing any charity made the socially-necessary campuses workable and created purchasing power for the marginal farmers/ agricultural laborers.

Why sharing this view–

1. Different social organizations are doing relief work, while keeping in mind the dignity of labour, same fund can be utilized by creating social resources simultaneously providing for materials needed by the distressed persons wherever that is possible.
2. This kind of fund can be utilized by repairing school buildings, small lanes, social institutes, damaged houses of destitute senior citizens ie all such work which are socially needed but is not under the purview of immediate allocation of government fund.
3. A major part of the donations for relief work come from salaried people, middle income groups. They as such are not moneyed people. Hence, the donation from their hard-earned money perhaps needs more attention for optimal utilization towards social motivation.
4. The beneficiaries would also feel respected when they will be able to earn to meet up their necessities. Unnecessary dependence on charity is a social evil.

5. The works monitored by social organizations are expected to be more proficiently managed than the "100 days" engagement.
6. All of us - distressed or otherwise, have certain social responsibilities. And there should be specific awareness in that regard. That is why, while receiving paddy seeds from SEVA, the farmers have committed to contribute one kilogram rice grain to SEVA after harvesting to support others who are in need of help. Thus, by helping 100 farmers we have ensured one quintal rice to be utilized for future social needs.

ANANDA KENDRA HOME

"Ananda Kendra", the centre of joy has been established in 1993 and is functional since 1995. Social Orphan, Battered Women and Child Labours and Senior Citizens are main beneficiaries of this project. We have started and continuing this experiment with unfortunate four sections of our society to **ROAD TO LIFE**. There is comprehensive plan for the all-round development of these people. Building up of a awareness and consciousness about the world environment is very important step towards that end. We have already been able to educate these children from unfortunate families restored dignity to the violated women and could make lives tolerate to some senior citizens.

At present of "Swadhar Greh" Project of the Department of Women & Child Development, Govt. of India and Directorate of Social Welfare, Govt. of west Bengal for shelter and rehabilitation of destitute women along with their children, if any. Children are going to Sishu Vikash Kendra and Adolescent Girls are going to local High school. The vocational trainings for rehabilitations purpose, such as Tailoring, Hand Embroidery, Nursing Training, Animal Husbandry Training, Food Processing, Art & Crafts, Bori Making, Mushroom Cultivation, Weaving, etc. Regular basis counselling provided to them as per their immediate situation. Medical needs are always looked after by a Qualified Doctor who visits once in a week and prescribes related medicines. The Home provides facilities towards Entertainments, like Cultural Programme (Indoor & outdoor), Films, Picnic, Outings, Indoors games, Library Meditation room is also present. The beneficiaries also participate in local cultural festivals under the project area. We observe the various days of importance and significance with active participation of the benefices.

CCI (Child Care Institute) is functional under Ananda Kendra since December 2017. Child Care Institute is under the Departments of Women & Child Developments, Govt of India and Directorate of Social Welfare, Govt. of West Bengal for care and protection of Children below 18 yrs. of age. Role of the A.K staff is to support children in the process of taking responsibility and accountability for actions and reformation. To encourage the child to make best of the opportunity. Children are counselled for their better future. Our beneficiaries are really co-operative and careful.

During Pandemic situation is tough for our beneficiaries. Spread of Corona & Lockdown imposition damaged our environment. In spite of this situation our residents made a wall magazine about their good memories. The beneficiaries are also involved in day-to-day activities.

All beneficiaries and staff are living in a family tie atmosphere.

Case Study:

Our experiences are very much in tune with the original concept of Ananda Kendra where it was envisioned that beneficiaries of different age groups would extend support to each other and would thus have the role of grand parent, aunties and children in a large family. A very endearing scene is Smt G. Devi, a beneficiary, aged above 50 years basking in the sun in winter with three babies of other younger beneficiaries as a grand aunty; another piece of positivity is one HIV positive beneficiary extending support to one MR mother by washing her clothes, showing how to dress up her kid. "None can tell, at whose beckoning vast waves of humanity merge into the Great Sea. All shall give and take, mingle and be mingled in, none shall depart dejected." (Translation from Bharat Tirtha, Rabindra Nath Tagore).

Manab Jamin

Manab Jamin a project of Society for Equitable Voluntary Actions (SEVA) completed nearly twenty-one years of developmental works in Bolpur - Sriniketan block of Bolpur Sub-Division of Birbhum district of West Bengal.

The project area is rain-fed, mostly mono-cropped and located at arid zone where the land is undulating consisting Red Laterite and Vindhya Alluvial soil. Rain is very unpredictable and it does not come when it is needed the most and comes when it's not expected. The temperature reaches to 46° C in the summer and drops down to 7° C in winter. Manab Jamin is largely working with Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribe and under privileged section of people.

EDUCATION

Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra

Manab Jamin has completed 21 years of its work at the backward areas of Birbhum District, West Bengal. The area is mainly inhabited by the members of Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe. The members of this society are basically agricultural labourer and they go out for work in the morning leaving young children in the hands of their older ones. The older children are expected to perform all the household activities during the daytime. The situation becomes acute during the time of sowing and harvesting when the demand for agricultural labour increases. We found that the rate of absence of parents is increased during this season. The project of Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra has been designed to cater to the educational needs of the children between the age group of 3 – 5 years. At present 6 MJSKs are running at 6 villages under Manab Jamin Project Area where 173 nos. of children are studying. Out of these centres the MJSK Binuria is being run in collaboration with Sinthi Alokchortika. The other 5 MJSKs are working in collaboration with Aiducatenow, California.

Mothers' Meeting

Mothers' meetings are very important to liaison with guardian / mothers of MJSK children. Mothers' meetings are held at respective schools on regular basis where

they discuss about the progress of the children. We keep records of weight and height of the children in their individual file. At the end of the session, the teachers of MJSK took the initiative for admission of the children at the local primary school. The Project In charge visits the school regularly.

In these meetings there are discussions on child care, child education, kitchen garden, food & nutrition, immunization, family planning, rules & regulation of the MJSK, health & hygiene, ICDP, etc.

Home Visit:

Home Visit is an important tool to run MJSK. All the teachers of the MJSK visit the home of the children of MJSK once in every week. Rapport building is grown up between the teachers and parents as well as family members of the children through the Home-Visit. There are personal interactions with the family members on kitchen garden, seed distribution, SHGs, health check-up of children, queries about irregularity of attendance of the children and information about the mothers meeting etc.

Patha Kendra: Coaching centres for primary school students

With the support from Isan & Kusum Paul Foundation, USA, Maryland, Manab Jamin started coaching centres Manab Jamin Patha kendras for children of primary schools from the year 2019. We are following the curriculum of Vidyacharcha Kendra. Parents, in different areas, are not in a position to guide their children properly for their school education, which make it difficult for the children to cope up with the school curriculum, resulting to increase in rate of school dropouts. Hence, to reduce the rate of School dropout, Manab Jamin had started a special coaching class for the children of SC, ST and economically weaker section of the community. The centres have gained popularity and some more centres are on the way to be initiated.
